Dr. Sherry Pictou

Etuaptmumk (Two-eyed seeing) & M'sit No'maq (All My Relations) in Conservation Practices

Abstract: Increasingly, Indigenous Knowledge is becoming valued in conservation efforts around the world. Yet are Indigenous People benefiting from those conservation efforts? Conservation practice has often been enacted as another way of dispossessing Indigenous Peoples from their ancestral homelands and waters. Therefore, how will conceptualizing reconciliation and re-indigenization translate into meaningful and practical conservation practice? Dr. Sherry Pictou discusses using a Mi'kmaw/Indigenous feminist lens to explore this question within tensions between capitalist development and conservation.

Dr. Sherry Pictou is a Mi'kmaw scholar at Dalhousie University and holds a Tier 2 Canada Research Chair in Indigenous Governance. She is the first female Honorary District Chief for the Confederacy of Mainland Mi'kmaq and is a member of the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) Task Force on Indigenous and Local Knowledge.
